Distracted Driving 1 min:10 sec Time on Simulator



Data shows that 91% of Americans have a cell phone and texting has increased over 2200% in the last five years! There are three distinct types of distractions: Visual, Manual, and Cognitive.

Visual- looking away from the road and viewing something unrelated to driving such as billboards, crash scenes, street signs, and other external stimuli.

Manual- removes one or both hands to perform some non-driving task such as eating, drinking, adjusting mirrors, tuning the radio, or programming a GPS.

Cognitive- mental thoughts and feelings (anger, anxiety, worry etc.) distract the driver and divert attention from the road. Nearly all crashes involve a combination of two or all three types of distractions.






SHARE THE ROLL OF THE ROLL OF

Trucks have huge blind spots called NO-ZONES around the front, back, and sides of the truck. Crashes occur more frequently here. If you can't see the driver in the truck's mirror, the driver can't see you.



Side No-Zones

Don't "hang out" on either side of large trucks. They have huge blind spots on both sides.



Front No-Zones

Pass Safely! Don't cut in front of the truck too soon after passing.

Back No-Zones

Avoid following too close. If you cannot see the driver's mirror, you are following too close.



Move Over

MOVE OVER LAW

When approaching a stopped emergency vehicle with visual emergency lights activated, drivers are required to yield the right-of-way to the vehicle by moving into the closest available lane from the emergency vehicle. When the roadway does not provide an additional lane, drivers are required to slow

down and provide as much space as possible to protect emergency vehicle operators in action.





Avoid Squeeze Play

Be cautions of trucks making wide right turns. If you get between the truck and the curb, you'll be caught in a "squoozo" and can

"squeeze" and can suffer a serious crash.

LEVEL 1 LEARNER PERMIT (PD)

REQUIREMENTS: 15 years old • Vision exam • Knowledge test • SF-1010 school form • Parent signature • Proof of U.S. citizenship/lawful permanent residency ISSUED FOR: 12 months

RESTRICTIONS: Accompanied by licensed driver 21 or older in front seat • No driving between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. • Seat belts mandatory for driver, front seat occupants and all passengers (child restraint devices for 9 & under) • All cell phone use (including texting) prohibited

LEVEL 2 INTERMEDIATE RESTRICTED (IR)

REQUIREMENTS: 16 years old • Valid PD held for 180 days
• SF-1256 form certifying 50 hours' driving experience
(must include 10 hours at night) • Pass driving test •
Cannot have 6 or more points in last 180 days
ISSUED FOR: Until age 21

RESTRICTIONS: One passenger in car • No driving between 11 p.m. and 6 a.m. • Seat belts mandatory for driver, front seat occupants, and all passengers (child restraint devices for 9 & under) • All cell phone use (including texting) prohibited

LEVEL 3 INTERMEDIATE UNRESTRICTED (IU)

REQUIREMENTS: 17 years old • Valid IR for 1 year • Must not have accumulated 6 or more points on driving record, an at-fault accident, or a 2nd seat belt conviction. (Note: Any of these convictions add 90 days of waiting to the IR.) ISSUED FOR: Until age 21

RESTRICTIONS: Seat belts mandatory for driver, front seat occupants, and all passengers (child restraint devices for 9 & under) • All cell phone use (including texting) prohibited

LEVEL 4 REGULAR CLASS D DRIVER LICENSE

REQUIREMENTS: 18 years old ISSUED FOR: Until age 21 ("Under 21" indicator will

RESTRICTIONS: Seat belts mandatory for driver, front seat occupants, and all passengers (child restraint devices for 9 & under) • Texting and driving prohibited
